Supervising behavior analysts are accountable for the professional activities (e.g., client services, supervision, training, research activity, public statements) of their supervisees or trainees that occur as part of the supervisory relationship. See 4.04 of the Ethics Code for Behavior Analysts	Clients receiving supervised services are the supervisor's clients. See Standard 4 of the College's Standards of Professional Conduct , and Supervised Practice Behaviour Analyst: Section H – Authorized Supervised Practice – CPBAO Public
What is the examination?	BCBA® Certification Examination	Ontario Examination for Professional Practice in Applied Behaviour Analysis (OEPPABA).
When can I complete the examination?	Once you have met all of the current eligibility requirements, you may apply for BCBA certification and receive approval to schedule an exam	Supervised practice candidates must attempt the OEPPABA within a year of issuance of the certificate authorizing supervised practice.
How many attempts at the exam can I take?	8 total attempts within a 2-year period	4

What are the continuing education requirements?	32 continuing education units (CEUs) within each 2-year recertification cycle, including 4 CEUs in ethics and 3 CEUs in supervision (for supervisors).	<p>The College's Quality Assurance Program can be found here. Upon registration with the College, RBAs are required to participate in the QA Program as all other registrants do. The requirements are the same for both ABA and psychology practitioners:</p> <p>Self-Assessment Guide (SAG): Supervised practice registrants complete a self-review and self-care plan every year.</p> <p>Continuing Professional Development (CPD): Minimum of 50 hours of continuing education and professional development activities every two years during their assigned cycle.</p> <p>Peer Assessment Review (PAR): Annually, the College selects a number of <u>autonomous practice</u> registrants at random to participate in the PAR process. The PAR is an onsite review of a registrant's practice conducted by two other registrants of the College.</p>
